

March Prayer of the Month

HOLY WEEK WORSHIP SERVICES

PALM SUNDAY

Sunday, March 24 at 10:00 AM

Palm Sunday commemorates the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. The gospels record the arrival of Jesus riding into the city while the crowds waved palm branches and spread them on the street to honor Him. The laying of palm branches was customary for a king and indicated that the dignitary was arriving in victory and triumph. However, immediately after this great time of celebration in the ministry of Jesus, He begins His journey to the cross.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

March 28 at 6:00 PM

Maundy Thursday is so called from the Latin *diem Christus mandatum* (the day of Christ's great mandate). After Jesus washed His disciples' feet, He gave them a new *mandate* or *command* to love one another. It was on this evening that Jesus shared the Passover Meal with His disciples, which the Church later adopted as "The Lord's Supper." During this unique service, we will receive Holy Communion through the ancient mode of intinction. The service will conclude with the stripping of the altar in preparation for the somberness of Good Friday.

GOOD FRIDAY

March 29 at 12:00 PM

Good Friday commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus and His death on Calvary. The service will include prayers, readings, music, and a message to provide meditation for us on this holy day.

EASTER SUNDAY

March 31 at 9:00 & 11:00 AM

Easter Sunday is the most important annual religious festival of the Christian liturgical year. On this Sunday, we will celebrate the miracle of the Resurrection and a message proclaiming hope and life will be heard.



HOLY WEEK MOVIE—The Passion of Christ

Running time: 126 minutes

The movie, *The Passion of Christ*, focuses on the last 12 hours of Jesus' life and begins in the Garden of Olives where Jesus has gone to pray after the Last Supper. Betrayed by Judas, He is then arrested and taken within the walls of Jerusalem where the leaders confront Jesus and His trial results in condemnation to death.

The Passion does not simply translate a single Gospel narrative onto the screen. Rather it is a composite of the Passion narratives in the four Gospels embroidered with non-canonical traditions as well as the imaginative inspiration of the filmmaker. Director Mel Gibson makes strikingly effective use of cinematic techniques to convey the divinity and humanity of Christ and captures the grand supernatural conflict which gives the death of Christ its meaning. This movie gives a realistic depiction of what might have actually happened at the crucifixion. Viewers are warned that several scenes depict graphic violence, and it may be disturbing to some.


Sweater Drive for Interfaith Works: Thursday, March 7


What is centering prayer? Centering prayer is a method of contemplative prayer with the sole intention of offering ourselves to God and consenting to God's presence and work within us. It is a spiritual practice of intentional silence, in which we let go not only of the noise and sounds of the outside world, but also seek to let go of the *inner noise* of our mind's wandering thoughts. It invites us to contemplation: communion with God beyond thoughts, words, emotions, sense experiences, or acts. St. John of the Cross tells us, "Contemplation is nothing other than a secret, peaceful, loving inflow of God. If given room, it will fire the soul in the spirit of love".






