



Deck the Halls

Centering Prayer


Centering Prayer Advent Centering Prayer:

Take time this Advent season to prepare your heart to receive the Christ Child through centering prayer. Allow the gentle glow of candlelight to calm your spirit as you respond to God's invitation to "Be still and know that I am God." Participants will devote 20 minutes of silence to centering prayer, seeking to let go of all that distracts them so that they can open themselves to Christ's presence and work within them. Centering prayer invites us to contemplation: communion with God beyond thoughts, words, or emotions.

In addition to centering prayer, facilitator Bertie Knisely will lead participants in deepening prayer practices such as breath prayer, sacred movement, and chanting. Participants will also draw on the deep connection of prayer as they practice holy sharing and listening together.

Come one and all and bring a friend. Both men and women are welcome.




SUNDAY, DECEMBER 10, 2023 @ 10:00 AM


Offering Envelopes

A WATCH NIGHT SERVICE Sunday, December 31, 2023 10:30 p.m. - midnight

A Watch Night Service: What Is It? The history of Watch Night dates back to 1733 in Moravian churches, when attendees observed a vigil to remember the previous year and to consider the upcoming one. In 1740, John Wesley instituted this custom for his Methodist followers, and the service evolved into a time for people to come together, pray, and reaffirm their devotion to God prior to the be-

ginning of the New Year. The first Watch Night service was held in the U.S. in 1770 in Philadelphia. Watch Night services also became an important part of African-American worship, because the Emancipation Proclamation would go into effect at midnight on January 1, 1863. Today many Christians from all denominations, races, and cultural origins continue to observe Watch Night. It's an opportunity to joyfully welcome in the New Year and sing and pray away the old one.

On Sunday, December 31, Watch Night services will be held at The Inter-Faith Chapel for the first time. As we pray out 2023 and get ready to welcome 2024, join us at 10:30 p.m. for a time of worship, testimony, and Holy Communion. Our service ends at midnight, and we will have refreshments and fellowship after the service. Come celebrate with us as we prepare to greet the New Year. Everyone is welcome to attend.

The Annual Martin Luther King, Jr Observance January 15, 2024 at 10:00 A.M.



Our guest preacher for the Annual MLK Leisure World Community Service will be the Reverend William H. Lamar, IV, Pastor of Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, DC. 
WE WELCOME OUR NEW MEMBERS AND AFFILIATES

Did you know?

The custom of bringing evergreens into the home began in the 16th century among northern and eastern Europeans, primarily Germans, as a means of cleaning up the Christmas tree and making it more uniform. Instead of throwing out cut-off greens, people wove the excess into wreaths.

However, the religious significance is that the circular shape and evergreen material of the wreath represent eternal life. The circle, which has no beginning or end, "symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul and the everlasting life we find in Christ."
